##### Chapter 1.1 –

- 71% of the earth's surface is covered by oceans.
- 29% of the earth's surface is covered in land.
- Oceans cover 139 million miles<sup>2</sup>
- 61% of the Northern Hemisphere is covered by oceans.
- 81% of the Southern Hemisphere is covered by oceans.
- There are five oceans: Pacific, Atlantic, Indian, Arctic, and Southern.
- The Pacific Ocean is the largest and deepest ocean out of the 5 listed above.

##### Chapter 1.2 –

- Continental margins – refer to the region of transition from the land to the deep seafloor, between continental and oceanic crust.
- Active Continental Margin – the boundary between the continent and ocean is also a tectonic plate boundary (a lot of geographic activity around the margin).
- Passive Continental Margin – occurs where the transition from land to sea is not associated with a plate boundary (less geologically active).
